Seawind Landing Country Inn Eastern Shore, Nova Scotia



Where dog meets sea meets sky

IMAGINE a day where all you hear are the sounds of the ocean; where you lose yourself in the sparkling water that fills your vision; where you just breathe. Here at the far end of the Eastern Shore, that day can be yours.

9 a.m. – After a leisurely morning of enjoying the sun rising over Tor Bay, wander over to Seawind Landing's dining room to make the toughest decision of your day. Will it be Seawind's signature Blueberry Stuffed French Toast Brûlée or the Eggs Benedict with scallops? Decisions, decisions!

Mid morning – Why rush? Head down to Seawind's beach and see if you can spot any sea life in the crystal clear waters. Then, hop in the car and head to Black Duck Cove park in Little Dover (about a 40 minute drive from the inn). While the warmest waters on the Eastern Shore are said to be found here, we go for the stroll. A beautiful boardwalk and gravel path circles the headland providing lots of spots to enjoy the crashing surf. The park's canteen is a good spot to grab a snack if you're hungry (open in high season)!

Around noon – head back up Hwy. 16 to Guysborough, and enjoy one of the prettiest drives in these parts. Pause for a picture of the Queensport Lighthouse, alone on its island; pause at the Prince Henry Sinclair monument overlooking Chedabucto Bay (can you spot Cape Breton in the distance?) and read a little about the Prince believed to have arrived a century before Columbus.

1 p.m. – Arrive in Guysborough village and enjoy a home cooked lunch at Days Gone By Bakery on Main Street. Perhaps you'll even have some time to browse through their gift shop or pick up some freshly baked goodies for the road. Sea air does make you hungry.

2 p.m. – Head back toward the inn and an afternoon of beachcombing at Tor Bay provincial park of the Atlantic. Sand, sun, and surf combine to create a beautiful place for a an afternoon of exploration or quiet contemplation. Quite often you will have the whole place to yourself. Truly a hidden gem!

5 p.m. – Time to head back to the Inn. Dinner will be served shortly and the sea air has worked up your appetite. But first, some time to relax in your the deck and watch the sun start to set on Tor Bay.

7:30 p.m. – Your table awaits. As sumptuous smells swirl from Seawind's kitchen, look over the menu of locally sourced, fresh seafood and other favourites. Let us recommend something from our list of Nova Scotia wines to complement your meal. Be sure to save room for the Bailey's Irish Cream Crème Brûlée , often said to be the best of its kind. Before retiring for the evening, pause to take in the moment - the moon casting a twinkly path over the water, the stars shining brightly up above and the waves lapping gently on the shore. Sleep well.
